

Gatumba Survivors Project Summer Internship

The purpose of this [archive](#) is to preserve witnesses to the 2004 Gatumba refugee camp massacre and evidence lifelong impact on survivors, through documenting the lives of this refugee group. This collection has been assembled with the support of the Gatumba Refugee Survivors Foundation and the survivors willing to share their experiences and network for the project. Included in the archive are transcripts of survivor interviews, select audio recordings of survivor interviews, and photos from both the massacre site and the lives of these refugees. Also included is a background essay on the massacre and links to further reading about this tragedy, with international reporting and video links to survivors' interviews given over the years to news media outlets. An internship for this project offers an opportunity to contribute to the building of this archive.

Expectations

Training necessary for these tasks is provided by Prof. Davey. This internship offers an opportunity to engage with this survivor community through understanding the ideas of memory, resilience, and trauma. Interns for this project are listed as contributors on the website. The work for this internship can be carried out remotely.

An internship for this project would involve the following tasks:

- Continuing the work of transcribing and formatting interviews
- Uploading documents and files
- Conducting new interviews via Zoom
- Regularly coordinate with Prof. Davey as the project lead, and library colleagues for technical support as this is a Digital Commons project
- Report on the work to on-campus and sponsors

Qualifications

Through the application process, candidates are expected to demonstrate the following:

- Excellent communication skills
- Collaborative working
- Ability to exercise initiative and be self-driven
- Attention to detail in editing and user experience

This role is open to all undergraduate students, but is especially applicable to those studying in history, political science, sociology, or the humanities.
