AWARDS

President Emeritus Wallace W. Atwood, founder and first Director of the Graduate School of Geography, and Dr. W. Elmer Ekblaw were honored by the Geographical Society of Chicago in February. Dr. Atwood, a founder of the society, was awarded the Helen Culver Gold Medal "for distinguished services in the field of geomorphology". Dr. Ekblaw received a citation recognizing his twenty-five years' editorship of *Economic Geography*. The awards were made on the occasion of the society's fiftieth anniversary observance.

SUMMER COURSES

The accelerated program will be continued through the 1948 summer session by Clark University. Geography courses to be offered include political and economic geography, regional studies of the Pacific Area, South America, and New England, regional physiography of North America, and cartography.

THE STAFF

Dr. Samuel Van Valkenburg has recently returned from the Southwestern Social Science Association meetings in Dallas, Texas, at which he presented two papers.

During the three-week trip, made by automobile, Dr. Van Valkenburg filled a heavy schedule of speaking engagements and contacted many Alumni of the School of Geography.

En route to Dallas, he spoke at the State Teachers College, New Haven, Conn.; the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, Tenn.; the University of Tulsa, Tulsa, Okla.; and the University of Oklahoma, Norman, Okla.

In Dallas, in addition to his participation in the Association meetings, Dr. Van Valkenburg lectured at Southern Methodist University. Before leaving Texas, he spoke in Austin, and visited Texas A & M at College Station and North Texas State Teachers College in Denton.

On his return, Dr. Van Valkenburg spoke at Louisiana State University, Baton Rouge, La.; Mississippi State College, State College, Miss., and the College for Women at Columbus; Alabama Polytechnic Institute, Auburn, Ala.; University of Georgia, Athens, Ga.; and Teachers College, Johnson City, Tenn.

Dr. W. Elmer Ekblaw has been engaged in a busy lecture program during the current semester. The first of two trips, from February nineteenth to March first, saw him at George Washington University, the University of Maryland, the University of Virginia, and the University of Kentucky.

At George Washington University, Dr. Ekblaw spoke on "Basic Principles of Geography" before one of Robert G. Campbell's classes, which consisted largely of ranking Naval officers.

He attended a luncheon seminar at the University of Maryland at which

Mr. S. Whittemore Boggs was speaker. In attendance were Dr. O. E. Baker, Dr. William Van Royen, Dr. Carleton P. Barnes, Dr. William Brierly, Kenneth and Margaret Battersby, and Mr. Charles Porter, all formerly associated with Clark.

Dr. Ekblaw spent much of his time at the University of Virginia in conference with the research men of the Institute of Geography. He delivered two popular lectures on the Eskimo and Russia, however, and led a seminar discussion of the essence of geography. During his stay he was in constant association with Lt. Col. Sidman Poole, Director of the Institute, Dr. Louis O. Quam, and Mr. Wayne Wallace.

At the University of Kentucky, where he visited Dr. J. R. Schwendeman, Mr. Harry K. Hutter, and Mr. Guy Parmenter, Dr. Ekblaw presented three popular lectures on Arctic life and Russia, directed three staff seminars in cultural geography, and held numerous conferences with the students.

Dr. Ekblaw is at present in the midst of his second trip in which he will deliver fifteen lectures to college groups in Iowa, North Dakota, and Minnesota.

Dr. Raymond E. Murphy is currently preparing a report of his last summer's field work in Micronesia for the National Research Council and is writing several papers for later publication.

Dr. and Mrs. Richard J. Lougee have been deeply concerned with the condition of their eight-year-old son, Gerard, who suffered a skull fracture and complications when struck by an automobile on January sixth. "Jerry" lay in a coma for thirty-six days, but responded miraculously well to treatment. Dr. Lougee reported happily on the fifty-first day after the accident that "Jerry" had regained his

vision, and on the fifty-sixth day, his speech.

"Jerry" is home now, slowly regaining the use of his limbs, and anxious as all-get-out to be playing again. All who know the Lougees will assuredly appreciate their happiness in knowing that "Jerry" is making a normal recovery.

During the semester, Dr. Lougee has maintained his lecture schedule. In addition he has completed a series of block diagrams depicting the physiographic sequence of New England and illustrating the theory of superposition. The diagrams are designed as a teaching device, eventually to be published.

VISITING LECTURERS

Five visiting lecturers and professors have been at the Graduate School in the current semester.

Dr. Paul Siple, an alumnus of the School of Geography and now Biogeographer in charge of Arctic Research, Research and Development Division, Department of the Army General Staff, presented four lectures in February. In his first lecture, at a Ph.D. seminar, he presented a graphic analysis of the accumulation of mass information throughout history. To the entire Graduate School, Dr. Siple spoke on climate and clothing, climate and housing, and, with illustrations, the achievements of the four Byrd Antarctic Expeditions, of which he was a member.

Mr. Walter A. Wood, Director of the Arctic Institute of North America, showed aerial motion pictures in color of the Canadian Arctic and Polar Regions to the Graduate School in February.

Dr. C. F. Brooks, former member of the staff of the Graduate School and now Professor of Meteorology at Harvard University and Director of

the Graduate School of Geography at the conference of the New York Geographical Association at Colgate University, Hamilton, N. Y., in April. Several Clark Alumni presented papers at the conference.

A chapter by Dr. Warman, "World Geography", is to appear in the 1948 *Yearbook of the National Council for the Social Studies*. In line with his interest in geography in education, Dr. Warman has been called upon to work with guidance counsellors of Holden, Grafton, and Auburn in presenting the potentialities of careers in geography to their high school students.

Mr. Guy H. Burnham is busy, as usual, restraining workroom activities and instructing in the "salt mines".

the Blue Hill Meteorological Observatory in Milton, Mass., spoke at the March sixteenth seminar, presenting problems inherent in climatic data and answering questions regarding unusual climatic situations.

Professor Robert E. Dickinson, formerly of the University of London, England, began a series of eleven lectures in the Graduate School on March twenty-fourth. Five lectures were devoted to the Political Geography of the British Empire, and six to problems of Human Geography. Previous to his coming to Clark, Professor Dickinson was visiting Professor of Geography at Syracuse University. In the summer he plans to lecture for two weeks at the McGill University summer session in Stanstead, Quebec.

Dr. Fridtjov Isachsen, Professor of Geography, University of Oslo, Norway, has been in residence during the second semester. Dr. Isachsen, on a year's sabbatical leave, was a member of the 1947 Field Camp and spent the first semester at the University of Wisconsin.
